"Dynamite Prayer"

In some ways, it seems like we were just welcoming in the new year, 2023. In other ways, 2023 has seemed to linger forever (and often in a not-so-good kind of way). But no matter how you feel about 2023, it is giving way to a new year. And with a new year comes opportunities for new beginnings, new hopes, and new direction.

As we begin 2024 at Holy Trinity Church, we will draw one sermon series to a close and begin a new one.

We began our Advent/Christmas series by acknowledging our weariness, and on January 7 we will conclude the series by trusting our belovedness. Ultimately, our joy is rooted in the fact that we belong to God. We will hear the story of Jesus' baptism, and then be reminded of our own belovedness as we remember our baptism.

I'm going to be on vacation January 14, but when I return we'll dive into "Dynamite Prayer," a 28-day experiment in incorporating the addition of a surrendered breakthroughprayer practice into our daily lives. The goal of this practice is to help cultivate the capacity to discern, to notice, to respond to God's guidance and to live by the miraculous power of the Holy Spirit.

Dynamite Prayer is a Conference-wide initiative, meaning that other United Methodists across the state (and in the Dakotas, too!) will be focusing on this very important topic. At Holy Trinity, I will be preaching on the subject on January 21 and 28 and February 4. In addition, several small groups will be formed and will meet between January 14 and February 10. Group members will be invited to read the book and come together to share their insights and ideas.


Each day's entry in the guidebook is divided into five key parts:

- A scripture reading that emphasizes God's dynamic power
- A personal devotional insight about some unique aspect of the Holy Spirit
- Prompts to assist you in cultivating your own honest and authentic reflection, journaling, or discussion with others
- A short breakthrough prayer to keep your heart and mind aligned and focused God-ward throughout the day. There's also space for you to create your own breakthrough prayer as well.
- An even shorter targeted breakthrough prayer version that has been nicknamed a "prayerhold," which is a style of prayer practiced throughout our historic Christian faith

Let's begin the new year in prayer, and see if we might discern God's new beginnings and new direction.

Inclusion Starts With I

I am writing this with the glow from the amazing success of our One Table event on December 17. It was so much fun to see so many people engaged in conversations and stories and to see the dazzling array of incredibly delicious food. As we reflected on the event, we realized that this is the perfect way to end our first year as a Reconciling Congregation and hope to make this an annual event. Our first Inclusion month emphasis was in May, right after Affirmation Sunday. We have shared different foci every month and will continue that into 2024. While it is important to remember that many members of our congregation have personal ties and histories with our Inclusion emphases, the One Table event included ALL members of our congregation. We ALL have stories to share and foods and traditions that are important to us. Inclusion is truly about Identity, and our Inclusion focus for each month opens our hearts and minds to others who may be different from ourselves, but who are ALL Children of God. January is National Poverty in America Month, which will be our I **Team focus.** The purpose is to shed a spotlight on one of the persistent and pervasive problems in America, including in our own community. Did you know that the U.S. ranks second highest in poverty rates among its peer countries? Poverty Awareness Month is about taking an opportunity to learn more about this social ill, raise awareness among others, and understand how everyone can help. All people want the same thing - to earn, learn and belong. Imagine a world where every person has access to basic necessities such as food, shelter, education, and healthcare – a world where poverty, in all its forms, has been eradicated and replaced with equitable and sustainable systems. As we reflect on what we can do, we should consider 1 John 3:17-18 "How does God's love abide in anyone who has the world's goods and sees a brother or sister in need and yet refuses help? Little children, let us love, not in word or speech, but in truth and action." May it be so. Remember, Inclusion starts with I.



New Year, Same Me

As I write this, the temps are above freezing and it is definitely not slippery outside, but I still have a sense of sliding, out of control, into the new year. It is always like this as we stretch ourselves in kids' and family ministry (KidsMin) at the Christmas season. Our PopUp-Intergenerational-Interactive Nativity program is always chaotic, never knowing how many people will show up, with multiple leaders figuring out the logistics on the fly, regardless of how well-prepared we tried to be. And this is on top of the usual KidsMin things we do trying to help families find identity, belonging and purpose in Jesus Christ. AND on top of my personal efforts to keep up with relationships and the to-do's of the season (my tree is still not fully decorated.)

But, as I reflect on the entirety of 2023, I can see ALL our best KidsMin stuff is chaotic and at least a little improvised. We can plan Vacation Bible School, and STORM Camp, I can be mindful of my share of responsibilities for events like our summer kick-off, Homecoming (Rally) Sunday, or Fall Festival, but something unexpected usually happens that helps us remember that the planning and prep and even the events themselves are not useless, but also are not the most important thing. The most important thing is ALWAYS the human interaction, the moments when we connect over a question, an observation, a story, a surprising challenge, an alarming problem, or an unexpected but gratifying outcome. Sometimes the moment involves a cute or funny incident when we can laugh together, or a mess where a wink of encouragement or quick helping hand lifts the burden, or it could be the sharing of a painful situation that calls for a hug or a prayer, or just taking time to listen. If we stay true to why we do all the things (building connections between people around a desire to know and serve Christ), then nothing that happens or fails to happen along the way is as big of a deal as we might fear.

And, I would say that this is a great way for all of us to think about the coming year. We all hope that some great things lie ahead, and we are probably all making plans to prepare for those great things. We might make resolutions to improve our habits, our health, our appearance, or our minds.

There is nothing wrong with that! But whatever we resolve to do will probably not intrinsically change us. I will probably never stop feeling anxious about chaotic events and will probably always waste time fussing over the wrong thing. But I can keep praying for the Holy Spirit to work in me so that, amid the inevitable chaos, I might see and act upon those opportunities for human connection. And I can remind myself to be thankful in all circumstances, to pray no matter what is happening, and to allow joy in Jesus Christ to be part of me always.

I have no plan for a "New Year, New Me," but I do think "same old me" with more gratitude, prayerfulness and joy would be a welcome change, and more of what God intends for me in my life. Maybe instead of a New Me, I will find I am becoming More Me, the me I was created to be, less dependent on image or outcomes, less fearful, and more trusting that God has got me and this world in hand. I hope you will find you too are becoming More You, focused on and blessed by God's purpose for your life, and that some of our KidsMin or other events in the Holy Trinity community will help you with that. Who knows, the connections you find may become your most important thing!

FISH is a network of organizations which operates as a nonprofit and is designed to help our partners meet the needs of their clients, parishioners, and community members. When a registered FISH partner submits a need, FISH posts the need to the Partner network with the hope that a partner or an affiliate can help the person in transition.

Fish partners are representatives of the faith community, local government and education entities, service organizations and nonprofits, and businesses which serve Scott County residents and agree that by partnering together we can meet human need in our community.

The Core Team met on Monday, December 19 at 6:30pm. Highlights of the discussion include:

- Outreach: There have been a number of inspiring events and activities in recent months, and there are
 many more ahead we are looking forward to. Our thanks go out to everyone who has participated in
 these events with their leadership and/or participation, and we hope your enthusiasm continues! In
 particular, the United Women of Faith were noted for their ongoing leadership and connectional group
 activities.
- Possible sale of property: the conversation is ongoing, and approval is being sought to bring it to the congregation for a discussion and a potential vote. Concrete information will be disseminated as it becomes available, but questions can be brought to Pastor Chad or Tanya Alemu, chair of Core Team.
- Leadership: We are grateful that new leaders have been identified; four new trustees to help manage and
 maintain our facilities and grounds, two more team members have emerged to help with Finance, and a
 new missions coordinator has stepped up. We continue to seek 2+ people to help advise in our Staff
 Parish Relations Team (the group that helps guide staffing decisions and support) and 2+ for the
 Core Team.
- For short term help we are seeking someone to coordinate soup suppers for Lent, recruiting and scheduling soup cooks, organizing what we will offer for sides, and scheduling support for set up, serving and clean up. People are often willing to volunteer to help do the jobs, but getting someone to organize, schedule and stay on top of the plan is extremely helpful for a positive experience for all.


