I am United Methodist!

I am a lifelong United Methodist. Not only was I born into the church and baptized as an infant in it, but I also chose this church in adulthood. What it means to be United Methodist fits my character, attitude and creation by God. I think you all already know that I love the church, I love the community of United Methodists and I love the United Methodist way of following Jesus.

In 2019 the United Methodist Church, in a special called session of the General Conference (the worldwide gathering of United Methodists), took a wide step away from who I felt God calling us to be. I didn't leave the church at the moment, but I understand why others had to move on. We have been waiting for over 40 years for the United Methodist Church to officially be a place of welcome, love and inclusion for ALL of God's people, especially our LGBTQiA+ siblings. Instead of leaving, I planted my roots in the UMC more deeply, hoping that I could work alongside of others to help the church become what God has called us to be.

We were working toward the regularly called 2020 General Conference in Minneapolis to do the work of affecting that change. And then the pandemic...

Finally, in April of this year (2024), the 2020 General Conference of the United Methodist Church will meet to shape its ministry and its future. We gather as a very different church than in 2019, after 25% of our churches have disaffiliated (left) the United Methodist Church over human sexuality. (The majority, if not all, of those churches held to a traditional view of human sexuality.) That changes the landscape of how the General Conference might speak for the United Methodist Church. Inclusive United Methodists are working to leverage this season in the United Methodist Church to officially become a place of welcome, Continued on next page...

love and inclusion, while making space for our siblings in the Global church to have a regionalized expression of Methodism.

The three priorities of the Reconciling Ministries Network (the group working on inclusion) are these:

- Adopt worldwide regionalization Changing how we relate as the church. This work would restructure the UMC based on equity and respect for missional context while maintaining our global connection.
- Adopt revised Social Principles Changing how we relate to the world. The proposed changes are more succinct, more theologically grounded, and better reflect the nature of the global church. The proposal includes removing the harmful language related to homosexuality and it defines marriage between "two people."
- Remove anti-LGBTQ+ language and discrimination – Changing how we treat each other. The goal here is to remove any language that targets LGBTQiA+ persons, creating a blank slate for future regional expressions.

You are likely reading this article after the final gavel has struck the podium, signaling the close of the 2020 General Conference Session. But for Minnesota United Methodists, and for us at Holy Trinity UMC as well, no matter what happens at General Conference, we know who and how we are as United Methodists. The Minnesota UMC values being rooted in Jesus, grounded in our Wesleyan theology, inclusive of all persons and engaged in the work of justice and reconciliation. Holy Trinity United Methodist Church will continue to be a Reconciling Congregation focused on loving God, uplifting people, inspiring hope, and growing disciples of Jesus Christ.

This is a fertile season in the United Methodist Church, and a great time to remind ourselves of what it means to follow Jesus in the United Methodist way. I hope that you will be present in

worship (in person or online) as we continue to explore the marks that confirm our identity as genuine and fruitful followers of Christ in the Wesleyan (United Methodist) way. They will remind us why and how we follow Jesus.

Join us in a season of hope for the United Methodist Church and a season of formation as United Methodists in Prior Lake and the surrounding area.

Mission Accepted

I was on last month's mission trip to Costa Rica with the Strong Missions organization. Their mission is to help those in need and empower their local communities to create sustainable change. With them we delivered food, renovated a home to make it habitable, and led activities with local kids. Strong Missions also works to help create and improve vegetable gardens, schools, churches, and other community resources. They motivate kids to strive for better lives by teaching them discipline and self-esteem through karate, traditional dance and VBS programs. And they show people that Jesus cares for them through all the things we do for and with them.

When I said yes to our first Strong/Costa Rica mission trip in 2018, I didn't know if I was ready. I don't speak Spanish. I doubted I had any skills that would be very useful. I really didn't know how I would do with the food or what the beds would be like. I thought a mission trip sounded like the kind of thing that Jesus would have us do but I was worried about many things. I took the chance despite my doubts because the Bible says a lot about trusting God, being obedient to God's call, loving our neighbor, and following Jesus. And it turned out great. I mean, it was hard work, and not luxury conditions, but the people we connected with were amazing and we did meaningful work, and nothing that I was worried about was really a problem at all. I came back with confidence in Strong Missions, more confidence in myself, and even more confidence in God's power to work through me even when I am not the best choice for a job.

This year it was my husband, Bryan's, first mission trip and I was afraid I had over-hyped it and it would be a disappointment. But it wasn't. Bryan had a great trip, and my experience was even better than the first time. It was wonderful to reconnect with many of the people I had worked with in 2018, connect with new team members and Strong Staff, and help on a variety of projects.

It is life-changing to experience the hospitality and beauty of another culture, to do something meaningful for another with no expectation of reward, and to trust that God will really meet our needs when we step out of our comfort zone to

follow him. There were many reasons to say no, or maybe later. But all those good things I experienced began with a "yes."

Costa Rica is a long way to go, and the next trip is not until 2026, but we have ways to live out our love for God and for others right here at home. Work on the Don Hartley Memorial garden is about to begin for the season, we have an opportunity to provide hospitality and feed our congregation and guests when we celebrate Pastor Chad's service to Holy Trinity with a pizza party on June 9, we need adults to help in several ways when we host STORM camp (local mission!) July 14-18, and leaders and decorators and food people are needed for the Camp Firelight Vacation Bible Week which is August 5-8. Each of these events is a variation on ways we have served our neighbors in Costa Rica. Our neighbors here also need to know that God loves them by the ways we care for them. Spending a few hours or a few days putting others who are outside our normal circles ahead of ourselves is saying yes to God's call, and the beginning of many good things.

There will always be good reasons to say no, or maybe later, when it comes to mission work. Maybe when we aren't so busy, or maybe when we feel a little more sure we are needed, or feel a little more like we want to. But we kid ourselves when we say these things, don't we? We will always be busy, unsure of our role, and not quite motivated on our own. It is God who makes the difference. God has been reaching for us, inviting us into community our whole lives. God sent Jesus to show us how we are to be (humble, grateful, obedient,) what we are to do (love, serve,) who we are to serve (each other,) and why (because when we do, God's love for us and our neighbors inspires hope.)

Holy Trinity is only one place to say yes to opportunities to live and serve others, but it is a good place to do this in company with others who are motivated by the same call to mission. May Mission of the Month



Midwest Mission Distribution Center is a logistical conduit for Christ's ministry. They receive a request from trusted nonprofits, then prepare items they have and ask their supporters for items they need. Volunteers process, revitalize, and assemble the donated items. Then, donations are shipped to their trusted partners to distribute to those in crisis.

Year-round, Midwest Missions is preparing for disasters. They work with UMCOR to receive, assemble, store, and disburse kits. They also work with Food For The Poor to pre-stage Disaster Relief supplies in Southern Florida and in 10 Latin American and Caribbean countries. Pre-staging allows for supplies to get to victims quickly despite disruptions in transportation due to the disaster. Their preparedness allows them to quickly disburse relief in the event of a disaster. They commit to responding within 24 hours once a request comes in.

Holy Trinity will be collecting monetary donations as well as specific items for their disaster relief/tornado cleanup kits. Please see the list below...

- 2 gallon Ziploc/resealable bags
- 1 gallon Ziploc/resealable bags
- Work gloves
- Permanent markers
- Colored duct tape
- Dust masks (not surgical masks)
- Heavy duty trash bags -33-45 gal

Inclusion Starts with I

May is Mental Health Awareness Month, and while that is important all year, this special month of recognition raises awareness about mental illness, its prevalence in today's society, and its impact on people of all ages and backgrounds. Since its creation in 1949, Mental Health Awareness Month has been critical in addressing the challenges faced by millions of Americans. One in five U.S. adults experience mental illness each year, and only half of them receive treatment. Nearly 20% of children and young people ages 3-17 in the United States have a mental, emotional, developmental, or behavioral disorder, and suicidal behaviors among high school students increased more than 40% in the decade before 2019. These trends were exacerbated during the COVID-19 pandemic. Raising awareness is the first step toward improving mental health. Knowing that mental health issues affect many of us in this church community can lead to compassion and understanding. The Core Team met Monday, April 22 at 6:30pm. Highlights of the discussion included:

- The Close the Gap campaign brought in nearly \$10,000 in additional pledges and many ideas for ways to raise the profile and possibly money for the church. Most ideas would take research or further detailed planning to be viable. A couple of people have volunteered to start planning or pulling together a team to research two ideas so far (hosting a flea market, and estimating kitchen remodel costs to be able to host community meals) and Core Team will be sharing a list of other ideas in the weeks ahead. If one or more of them excite your interest let us know so we can connect you with others to get the ball rolling.
- The I Team is happy with the turnout and conversation started in the Rethinking Neurodiversity event on April 21, and with the promising number of sign ups for the Ellie Krugg Grey Area Thinking event on May
 More events will be planned beginning in August or September.

END OF THE FIRST QUARTER

We ended the first quarter at a -\$12,555.00.

The Close the Gap fundraiser came in at 41% of goal. This is \$13,675.00 short of our goal.






Lakefront Bible Study

Save the Date: STORM CAMP 2024

STORM Camp 2024 will be at Holy Trinity July 14-18 for kids who have finished 7th-12th grades, and adults

who want to make some lives better and be moved by amazing worship. STORM sends groups of five 7-12th grade youth and an adult driver to residences (and businesses, occasionally) with the tools needed to do a half-day to a day's work. We do things like yardwork, painting, cleaning, minor building projects and/or demolition. The staff team contacts those we're serving ahead of time and check the jobs, then they work with the teams who will do the work -typically checking in during the day and offering support as needed. We're not professionals, but pride ourselves on good work and good conversation with homeowners (as appropriate). STORM doesn't charge for our services (donations are accepted).
