A Time of Transition

June 9.



This day will mark the end of my 11-year season of ministry at Holy Trinity United Methodist Church. By then my office will be packed up, computer files backed up, and email set to a message that indicates who will be receiving messages in the future. I will have held my final Core Team, SPRT, Care Team, and staff meetings. At 9:30am on that day I will step into the pulpit to lead my final worship service and preach my final sermon here. And before I walk out the door after the Farewell Party, I will leave my keys in the church office. I will no longer be the pastor of Holy Trinity United Methodist Church.

June 9 will be a bittersweet day. I have enjoyed the past 11 years as your pastor immensely. We have accomplished much together, and I have grown to love the members of this church and community. It will be hard to say good-bye and walk out the door for the last time.

But I will. And on June 24 I will walk into a different office in a different church building and begin ministry in a different community. I will begin a new season of ministry as pastor of The Well: A United Methodist Community located in Rosemount, MN.

Change is hard. And transitions can sometimes be messy. So let me share with you a couple of reminders:

- After June 9, I will no longer be your pastor. I will not accept invitations to perform services (weddings, funerals, baptisms, etc.) here. That will be the responsibility of Pastor Leigh. Please consult with her when occasions like these arise.
- Pastor Leigh and I are two different people. We will likely preach differently, teach differently, lead differently, relate to people differently. Be prepared to receive Pastor Leigh's gifts without judgment or comparison. *Continued on next page...*

Your Whole Heart

Sometimes in a romantic movie the main character finds someone they instantly care about, are excited to connect with and can't wait to be more and more a part of their life. "Love at first sight" stories can be about a passion that grows and stabilizes, or one that burns out and falls apart. Other movies feature a situation in which the main character has a "boy or girl next door" kind of friend, and be glad they are there, but keep them at arms' length and kind of take them for granted. Usually something happens that makes them question, have I been missing out on something important? Sure, maybe this guy does not dress the coolest, but hasn't he been there for me when I needed him? Or maybe this girl doesn't draw every eye in the room, but isn't she one who cares about the real me?

Surprise! Or maybe not if you know me; I am talking about the church. I have attended my small church for almost 30 years and I have worked here for over nine years, coordinating children's, youth and family activities and doing a bunch of other church things. When my husband and I first brought our infant son, Sam, to Holy Trinity it felt right. It was a comfortable environment with a familiar setup, and the people were gentle and kind. There were other parents of kids our son's age, who seemed nice. It felt homey. I jumped right in, teaching Sunday school (to middle schoolers!) and taking roles on various committees. I smiled and helped wherever it seemed like help was needed and never let on that actually I was struggling to keep work, parenting and all the other life things together. I kept at it, doggedly, determined to give both our boys a life that included Sunday school, children's messages during worship, and a community of people who followed Jesus.

But no matter how much energy I put in, how often I attended, how hard I tried to fulfill any role I took on, I didn't feel a sense of belonging. It was draining. I did not, and do not, blame the people at Holy Trinity for this. Many of us (maybe most of us?) struggle with feeling connected in group settings. I was awkward over cookies and coffee after worship, feeling I should act a certain way to be accepted and fearful of rejection. Maybe it would have been easier to quit going to church but even if I wasn't feeling blessed,

I believed church community is a source of blessing. I wanted more. I wanted the post-Pentecost community described in the book of Acts where people who were filled with the Spirit gathered to worship and praise God and care for each other. (Seriously, read the book of Acts, it is beautiful.) I wanted that in my church setting. After years of armslength connection I wanted to know if I could fall in love with my unassuming friend, Holy Trinity.

In any romance movie, the main character has to take some risks. And so did I. Where I had been pouring in time and energy, trying to forge belonging and maintain some kind of acceptable, superficial image, I needed instead to open my heart, be the real me, allow myself into other people's lives and let them into mine. Where I had been trying to prove myself to God by doing all the things and trying to be or appear perfect, I instead had to accept my own imperfect self, re-acknowledge God's power instead of mine, and embrace worship of God as a privilege and a joy, not a burden. Being able to accept my own flawed self as God's beloved made it easier to stop holding others at arm's length and to see them as beloved children of God. When I could truly welcome the Holy Spirit to work in me, I found I was less worried about rejection by others.

In romance movies there is often a makeover, in this case the makeover was all in how I viewed the relationship. It started as something worthwhile, but difficult and awkward and became something tender and wonderful. It became more real. In a world where things are often difficult or disappointing, where there are many reasons to grieve, and so very much to do, I needed something hopeful and real to sustain me. A true love with God, through Jesus, grows best in community, like the ordinary, imperfect, but also miraculous Holy Trinity community. Maybe you need a new look at something that has been right by you this whole time. I invite you to take a new look at your church. If you have felt guarded, or that something is missing, ask God to show you if the thing that is missing is your wholehearted self.

United Methodist with no exceptions due to the now former policies and language concerning the LGBTQ+ community. The Reconciling Ministries Network (RMN) began in 1984 as a direct result of the United Methodist's official statement that "The practice of homosexuality is incompatible with Christian teachings." Over the years the RMN has expanded its mission to include all marginalized communities, and at Holy Trinity one of our major goals has been to provide education, financial support, and programs for all marginalized communities. The question has been asked that, now that the United Methodist Church has changed its language and its policies about the LGBT+ community, why should we continue to be a Reconciling Congregation? I believe that being Reconciling is to embody the spirit of inclusivity and to intentionally act in ways that reflect that spirit - something that a congregation lives into. Thus, while General Conference is something to celebrate, the work continues! Yes, the work continues. As we move into a new season, we are hoping to add more events and opportunities to "embody the spirit of inclusivity" as a Reconciling Congregation. Holy Trinity's United Women in Faith **May Gathering** was a **Spring Luncheon** at Dangerfield's in Shakopee. Springtime and fellowship were celebrated by all. An added moment of fun with lots of laughter was the "What's in your Purse?" game!



The Grand Opening of **Emma Norton's Restoring Waters** was held on May 14 at their new location in the new Highland Bridge development. Sara Modders, Nancy Iverson and Sharon Dougherty from our unit attended the event. Restoring Waters is home to more than 60 individuals and small families. It was designed as a trauma-informed environment offering physical and mental health support, in addition to programming and services to help those recovering from homelessness. From the use of natural light, colors and artwork inspired by nature, and programming spaces of artwork, gardening, meditation, exercise, and more—Restoring Waters will help people thrive.

Restoring Waters also will offer the "Living Room Model" as an alternative to emergency room care for mental health support, serving not only the people living there but also residents with proximity to the Highland Bridge development. Restoring Waters is the next step in Emma Norton Services' more than 100year history of supporting women.
