Letting Go

I call it the "closet of shame" – the one off the living room where I put all the boxes. You see, I live in a one-bedroom apartment. It is a decent sized apartment as they go, but storage is limited. It was a challenge after nine years in a 1700 square foot parsonage, but now I am back to where I was before I left Minnesota in 2015, when for many years I owned a one-bedroom condominium. Now, if a piece of furniture comes into my home, another piece must leave. The same with dishes and knick-knacks.

In the "closet of shame" are several boxes from my parents' home – boxes of loose photographs that my mother never got around to organizing, boxes of papers that I don't want to toss – their marriage license, birth records, etc., and little things that remind me of them. And the extra memorial cards, bulletins and candles from the funeral home. It's hard to find the emotional energy to sort through these things, so they live in the closet of shame, a reminder of things unfinished.

It is much better than it was. When I went through items before I left Iowa, I found, underneath the boxes from my parents' home, two large boxes filled with notes and papers from my seminary classes! And elsewhere, file folders containing job reviews from every job I have worked since college. And file folders for all of my volunteer work. Those reviews give you such a sense of accomplishment – or so I remember. I hadn't actually looked in those files for at least 12 years.

Our homes are filled with memories. Around every corner and in every creak are the memories of laughter and love, and also some anger and grief, but it is the joy that tends to stay with us. In every item that occupies space is a memory of a person or event. Some things are infused with guilt as *Continued on next page...*

well – how do you give up Aunt Edna's dishes, even if you never really liked them? To sort through our house is to touch our memories, and also to touch our own mortality.

Before the move this summer I was talking to my sister on the phone, lamenting about the furniture and full closets and too-full filing cabinets, and how I just couldn't seem to get things in order. "I'm overwhelmed with work!" I said. I just couldn't get through it. Or, I just couldn't get through it alone. My sister must have sensed this because she surprised me with this response: "I'm coming and we will go through it all." You know your sister loves you when she is willing to help sort through your clutter.

My sister has many gifts. She is an artist and a retired banker. She knows what must be kept and what has no purpose. So, as we went through pictures, she discarded all the multiple, unflattering or poorly aimed photos, and the pictures of people that we couldn't identify. And... she "encouraged" me to let go of the files. All of the evidence of my work history and my passion – dumped into the recycle bin in the garage. "I will have no evidence that I was ever there!" I said. My sister informed me that they keep records on that sort of thing – not that I will ever need it.

I think these things have defined me, in my own mind. Not the symbols – the papers and photos – but the things they represent. My career, studies and volunteer work. Perhaps they feel as much a part of me as the gifts and mementos from my family. As the files were poured into the recycle bin I felt like I was being emptied – like that part of my life's work was gone also. But then came the freedom. No more chaos and things to move and store. No more mounting evidence of the years that have gone by.

I realized then that my life experiences were not in the dumpster – they're in me. I get to keep them and take them wherever I go, for a while at least – eventually the memories may slip away as well. I think aging must be God's way of slowing us down so we appreciate and take into ourselves all that we have seen and done. Just as God rested on the seventh day and looked at creation, and saw that it was good, so we are to do with our lives. Of course not all of our memories are good. God has had struggles with creation as well. But both our successes and mistakes are part of who we are. We need to see ourselves with humor and compassion. Surely the duck-billed platypus is a sign that God has a sense of humor! And we are not done living until we leave this place.

This Sunday is All Saints Sunday, when we will remember those who have gone before us and shaped our lives. We will look to our past, and the foundation upon which we stand. Then next month will be Advent, when we are reminded to be ready for the next thing. We empty ourselves - within and without – to make room for something new. Just as a mother might encourage a kindergartener to give up his baby blanket in exchange for a toy that suits his age, God encourages us to give up the things that we cling to in exchange for the hope that is to come - the next thing. Advent is the season of hope and anticipation. This Advent we will focus on new beginnings – on preparing ourselves so that God can enter our lives anew. To let go is to have freedom and possibility in your life. And isn't that exciting?



Inspiration and Perspiration

We just finished hosting a massive weekend of fun for our community and I am still processing it all. Our first ever Haunted House on Saturday was successful beyond our imagining, with 85 people visiting and giving us glowing reviews ("better than Valley Scare," "thank you for doing this," "this is the coolest thing I have done in my whole life!" "I'm calling my friends to come," and "please do it again next year.") Then on Sunday morning we hosted Fall Fest with the PLHS Interact Club doing a Trunk or Treat in the parking lot. Hospitality for both events was provided by the BOM team with pizza and guick breads, a LOT of popcorn popped by Ardys Sabin, and our Sunday morning fellowship hour hosts, the Trebesch's. On Sunday we had crafts and games, and the wind made things a little more difficult, but again, the dozens of people who visited seemed really appreciative of the ways our people and our building were a place of welcoming and good cheer.

These events are ministry. It isn't praying (although believe me a LOT of prayer went into them), or preaching (although we were mindful of what messages we were sending,) but they are extending ourselves to other beloved children of God. So much of what we have done: building and using the brick oven, building and keeping up the playground, installing and maintaining the lift and ramps, recruiting and equipping volunteers for events that take planning and then promoting those events so people know about them, is difficult and there is an expense to it. People could say it is too much trouble and what do we at Holy Trinity get out of them?

This past weekend we got to lift up our guests' spirits and enjoy their responses. The guests' appreciation in turn lifted up the people in the Haunted House and volunteering at the Fall Fest, and the people hosting in the Fellowship area. The guests kept saying how impressed they were and we kept saying to ourselves, "so many happy people, can you believe it?" Our youth got opportunities to dream big, got pushed to manage those dreams, found out that people supported them and wanted them to succeed, and felt appreciated. All of the infrastructure that our church has put together with hope over the past several years: the brick oven, the playground, and the

lift and ramps (a heartwarming story, please ask me about it) was used. We laughed together, and gave each other grace over little problems and imperfections, and found out we can do big difficult things with style. We loved our neighbors and each other by going the extra mile, saying yes to something none of us were sure about, and showing up.

I was deeply involved in most of the non-food aspects of this weekend, but I want to be clear, this was not my idea. Pastor Leigh cooked up this plan with a few youth and the flicker of interest grew into a full flame of inspiration. Nothing would have happened without the support of the families of youth, and the church staff, or the resources and expertise generously given by others. It wouldn't have been the success it was without the people who have been involved with the bread oven pizza and popcorn from the cart, and the lift and the ramps and the playground. We all shared love by saying yes to going the extra mile, showing up, and doing the work, and with God's help we can all continue to be a loving presence for our community and for each other.

Core Team Corner and Upcoming Events...

The Core Team met Monday, October 14. Highlights of the discussion included:

- **Finance:** The new Finance team met with Tanya Alemu as the new Finance chair, Kelly Loose, treasurer; Pastor Leigh, and Paula Green, Core Chair. The team agreed that the way the current accounts are set up creates a confusing picture, primarily because of mission giving, but also due to some accounts that were closed and the balance moved into the church's general fund, which appears as income though it is not. The team will be opening a new Old National Bank account to separate mission giving and payouts from the general fund for clarity. Once the mission money is separated, and the apportionments are paid off (important for opportunities for grants and other annual conference support), the general fund will be at \$60K by the end of this year, the minimum for reserves on hand set in 2020. By policy, we cannot spend more than we take in at this point.
- New Partners: Representatives from the Shakopee Community Assistance and Toy Closet visited Thursday, October 17 to see if the lower level of the Parsonage would be appropriate to house their programs. Following the tour, SCA and Toy Corner agreed to rent the space for \$1200 per month, plus payment for garbage and WiFi, beginning January 1st. HTUMC will replace the ceiling in the main room and upgrade internet access in the building, for a cost of about \$1500. They suggested we contact Loaves and Fishes to see if they might be interested in a similar arrangement in the church building.

Inclusion Starts with I By Carol Ottoson

One of my favorite hymns of all time is "A Place at the Table" by Shirley Erena Murray. Every verse is inclusive – with the chorus summing it up with "And God will delight when we are creators of justice and joy; yes, God will delight when we are creators of justice – justice and joy." This is why the I Team is celebrating "A Place at the Table" during the final quarter of 2024. Our goal is education and hospitality. We need to remind ourselves that immigrants, refugees, migrants, and undocumented immigrants are real human beings whose life experiences are extremely difficult, yet they are so often treated as our enemies, rather than beloved children of God. When we dehumanize and demonize other people, we take away their very existence. Genesis 1:27 is very clear that all people are created in the image of God (Imago Dei). We are ALL God's children. Jesus reminds us to "love our neighbors as ourselves." Our whole "Do Unto Others" Campaign challenges us all to reject the rhetoric of hate and embrace the beauty of love.

The I Team started our education process with Cindy Bahmer's comments and education piece on Immigrants. Lori Boynton continued it with information on Refugees. In November, Kay Petterson will discuss Migrants, and Rene Meyer will wrap up our series with information on Undocumented Immigrants. It is important for us to seek the truth about other people's lives, experiences, and humanity. Jesus reminded us in his Sermon on the Mount to "Judge not, lest ye be judged."
