Our Lenten Journey

Living in the moment has always been a challenge for me. I don't dwell much in the past, but I spend plenty of time in the future! I tend to look ahead, dream big and occasionally take on more than I should. Time seems to move so quickly – it's hard to believe as I write this that Ash Wednesday is next week and the season of Lent is upon us. And yet, it is because we in our society move so quickly that we need to intentionally take time to slow down, reflect, and find peace in our souls.

Lent is just such a time – a time in our church year when we change direction. The anticipation and waiting of Advent, the celebration of Jesus' birth at Christmas time, and the many small revelations of God's majesty throughout the season of Epiphany lead us to this time when we follow Jesus on that rocky and treacherous road through the mountains to Jerusalem, and finally to a cross on the hill of Golgotha.

The church has celebrated the season of Lent since the fourth century. It is a forty-day period of prayer, fasting and reflection that mirror the forty years that our ancestors wandered in the wilderness, and the forty days in which Jesus was tempted in the desert. During Lent we pray and embrace other faith practices, reflecting on the ministry of Jesus Christ and on our own discipleship. We "fast" from our own wants and over-indulgences, emptying ourselves so that we can be filled with what God wants for us. We remember the sacrifice that Jesus was willing to make so that we might know God's love and forgiveness and freedom.

The journey to Jerusalem and the crucifixion, death and resurrection of Christ are central to our Christian faith. While we study Jesus' teachings to learn how we ought to live, it is through the event at the cross - his willingness to suffer, his forgiveness for his enemies (and friends), his unending love for all of us, and his ultimate triumph over death -

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

it is through this event that we are invited into an eternal relationship with Jesus Christ. As we open ourselves fully to this relationship, we too find the courage and willingness to confront our fears. We too overcome betrayal and learn to forgive. We too learn to love and find the joy of serving God and our neighbor. We too experience the power of God's ultimate truth that surpasses anything this earthly life can dish out to us.

This Lenten season, we will explore the life and faith of Peter, Jesus' renowned disciple, as a tool for exploring our own faith journeys. In Peter, we see a person who is both steadfast and unsteady, a dear friend and a betrayer, a follower and a wanderer. In Peter we often see ourselves. Faith is a constant journey of steadfast pursuit, one that ebbs and flows. We will focus on the ways Peter keeps going: he drops his nets, he walks on water, he runs to the empty tomb, he swims to the shore to meet the risen Christ. He keeps searching and yearning and loving, even after missteps or mistakes. By following Peter's journey, we watch the story of Jesus unfold through the eyes of a very normal human trying to figure it all out – just like us.

In addition, on Wednesday evenings during Lent we will have a soup supper beginning at 5:15pm. On Ash Wednesday we will have a service at 6:00pm, and then on the following Wednesdays we will study together the book *Simon Peter: Flawed But Faithful Disciple* by Adam Hamilton, beginning at 6:00pm. The study will include a guided conversation enhanced by weekly videos filmed by the author in the Holy Land.

Join us in this introspective Lenten season. As we wander, may our hearts be attuned to God's grace.



Inclusion Starts with I

We will be celebrating our second anniversary of becoming a Reconciling Congregation on March 2 of this year. Please join us for cupcakes and conversation after church on the 2nd as we proudly commit to being a safe space for all. Many positive events have happened both in the over-all United Methodist Church, as well as in our local church. On May 1st of 2024 the General Conference of the UMC removed the ban on LGBTQ restrictive language with an approval rate of 93%. As a Reconciling Congregation we commit to living into the goals of being welcoming to all. Since we've become a Reconciling Congregation, the I Team has taken on many initiatives for the good of us all. We are strong proponents of Radical Hospitality. We've added greeters at both doors every Sunday. During our first year, we presented monthly emphases giving educational information about people who are often marginalized, including people who live in poverty, immigrants, people with neurodiversity, memory loss, and disabilities. We also featured education on LGTBQ Pride, Native Americans, Black Lives Matter, domestic violence, mental health, and bullying. We've hosted discussions on neuro-diversity, had an amazing performance by the Flames, and invited Ellie Krug to talk about transgender issues and our own identities. We've introduced the One Table Event, which is now an annual event on the 3rd Sunday in December, where we share our own favorite dishes and recipes from our culture with others.

This year we've taken a different approach and are featuring quarterly emphases. We are currently in the last month of the Love Your Neighbor campaign. You are encouraged to get your slips turned in by the end of March. We will share some of the stories on the first Sunday of April. In April we will move into Golden Rule, which includes domestic violence, bullying, gender, and pride. My final comment is very personal and one that Pastor Leigh has emphasized too. It is essential that we are a safe space for all. I can guarantee you that nearly everyone in our congregation has a connection to someone you may have negative feelings for. Love is not political, nor is treating others with respect political. It is Christian behavior in action. Jesus taught us to love our neighbors as ourselves. Jesus truly loved all, as should we. Remember, Inclusion starts with I.

A Winning Team

People come up to me often and remind me of when we had a roomful of kids for just about every grade level, and 2-4 leaders for every room. I, too, remember those classrooms, having taught in Sunday school and VBS most of the years I have been a member here. One of the reasons we started the position of Children, Youth and Family Ministry Coordinator (which I unofficially call Kids' Ministry Director) ten years ago was because of our diminishing numbers attending our weeknight and Sunday school activities. Yes, ten years ago, not just since Covid-19 or since we began discussing being a Reconciling Congregation.

Back in those high attendance days we had a lot of things working to our advantage; a tight-knit group of parents with kids of similar ages who attended school together, fewer scheduling conflicts on Wednesday and Sunday nights, and a cultural understanding that giving time at church was a valuable investment for your family and your community. Now our kids come to us from many different schools and often don't know each other, feeling like they are the "new kid". Everyone has multiple demands on their time, day and evening, seven days a week, and a lot of people question whether they or their kids get enough out of the traditional church experience to make the challenge of showing up a priority more than occasionally. It feels to many like we are losing something.

So, how do we win at Kids' Ministry? What does winning even look like?

The number of people attending can be a sign of a ministry's health, but it isn't the best sign. For our "littles" the winning outcome is simply helping them feel valued and loved at church and telling them that love is connected to Jesus. For our older kids, the important outcome is an extension of that: how their church life impacts the other areas of their life. A young person who learns through repeated experiences at church that they are seen, known and welcomed by God and by their community, that they belong, and that they have a God-given purpose, can come to believe they are known, belong, and have value everywhere despite what the world may tell them.

What about the Bible? What about the church teachings? These things are important, but I know when I look back on my own Sunday school experience, what I remember is flannel board storytelling, a nice lady sitting with us in a circle, paste pots for crafts and paper handouts to take home. I remember feeling like there were spaces in church (a pew and a classroom) where I belonged. Most of what I learned and retained about the Bible and about Jesus I learned from the Bible storybooks that I read and loved at home, not from Sunday school, and I think that is still true today.

How do we win? We all bring our love and attention to each other on Sunday mornings. We minister to each other in love and care, as well as receive the ministry of others. When we do this in worship, in fellowship spaces, and at events at Holy Trinity, our children and youth learn to love church, and will want to know more about Jesus who is the reason we are here. This is life-giving work, for them and hopefully for us too. If we can share a flicker of our own genuine love for Jesus and the work God is doing in our lives, we will have surpassed winning and reached excellence.

Get to know your neighbor by:


- Volunteering
